Farooq et al. (2012) and Anup K.C. et al. (2014) focus on the direct positive impact of tourism on local livelihoods. Farooq et al.'s study in Galliyat emphasizes the perception of tourism as beneficial by local communities, while Anup K.C. et al.'s study in the Manaslu conservation area of Nepal suggests that tourism participation enhances local income and living standards. While the horseshoe lake existed prior to this cataclysmic event, the quake reshaped its bed, giving rise to the present-day Chandubi. In
